TODAY'S GOSPEL READING - THE PARABLE OF THE TALENTS

It is hard not to feel sorry for the third servant in today's gospel. The first two servants are praised for making the most of the 'talents' (money) given to them by their master. In return, they are promised even greater things.

The third man, paralysed by uncertainty, buries his small amount of money in the ground instead of doing something with it. His actions are based in fear –he has heard the master is tough and he does not want to take any risks. At least he is able to return what he has been given; he reasons. But he is shocked to learn that instead of praise, or even a neutral reaction to match his own neutral actions, he is reprimanded as 'wicked and lazy' and cast out. This parable has been described as a story of 'tragic miscalculation'. The servant didn't do anything awful –which is why we tend to have some sympathy for him –but he didn't do his best either. The real tragedy is not that he didn't make any more money; it is that he failed to appreciate the opportunity he had been given and to make the most of it.

We are all dealt different cards in life, and undoubtedly some are much tougher than others. We are like the servants in the parable who are given different amounts of money to look after. The point is not the amount of 'talents' given to each. It is not the circumstances of our lives or our natural gifts that are important, but how we use them. Jesus was cautioning against playing it safe. Instead of turning inwards or living in fear, we are called to meet challenges head on and discover what wonderful things might happen.

JUST A THOUGHT: We've heard a lot about what's called the hospitality industry in recent times. People who run restaurants and pubs are warning us that many might close down for good if the Government further restricts their opening hours because of Covid 19 spreading. Already, the restrictions are having an impact on the livelihoods of chefs, waiters and bar-staff, as well as their customers and clients of course.

There was a time, though, when hospitality was not so much an industry, but a term more connected with places like monasteries and convents. It was about offering a welcome to people who were strangers, who needed physical assistance, from a meal to a bed for the night.



This idea of hospitality owed its origins to the monks' Christian beliefs but it is also strong in Judaism & Islam. No doubt it's linked to their roots in desert lands, where life for someone on the road could be precarious. These faiths taught that a stranger in need who arrived at the door was not so much a threat or a nuisance but an honoured guest. Islam sees hospitality as a three-sided relationship between the host, the guest and God, while in his monastic rule; St Benedict said that guests are to be welcomed as if they are Christ. Benedict was profoundly influenced by the teachings of Jesus who urged the disciples to recognize him in those who need their help.

As part of the Christian duty of hospitality, each monastery had either a separate guest house, or accommodation for visitors. The number of guests a religious house received depended upon its size and location. A large monastery, in the centre of a city, such as Canterbury in England, might be chosen for important religious meetings and the house would be expected to accommodate large numbers of guests, as well as receiving those visitors to the town who needed a bed for the night. Smaller monasteries, in rural or remote locations might receive only a few visitors a year. Although visitors were staying within the precinct of the monastery, they were not expected to follow the same rules as the monks. For example, although guests were encouraged to attend daily mass, they were not expected to rise at daybreak for the service of matins nor were they served the strict diet of a monk; rich or influential guests could expect to eat as well as they would have done at a palace.

Recently, Pope Francis referred to St Benedict's rule. Hospitality, he said, was a way of rising to the challenge of treating others with the utmost care and attention, and that encountering people outside our own circle is a gift. The beauty of hospitality is that it's of mutual benefit. It's a way of drawing people in, while being welcoming to guests also draws the hosts out of themselves, to focus on other people.

But in a pandemic that's more difficult as all of us are restricted in who we can meet, even our own relatives, let alone be welcoming to others. So being hospitable, in this theological sense, might be the opposite of opening doors, but focusing on the needs of others by keeping them shut. Instead, being concerned about others might be about simple acts, such as making a phone call to someone who lives alone, or delivering food. Pope Francis called hospitality moving beyond ourselves and our own interests. And even in a pandemic that can still be possible. – *Fr. Dick Lynn OSA*
