

JAN: Glencorrib Kilroe Walkway has its grant application approved by Leader (South West Mayo Development Co.) & Minister Michael Ring for €71,250. The 41st Glencorrib Senior Citizen's Party takes place. Cllr Michael Burke committed a further €2,000 to the project. The Shrule Operation Transformation walks begin. Frances (Francie) Mohan, Bridie Egan and Mick Coleman went home to God

FEB: The weather cancelled the Shrule Vintage & District Autojumble. 8 young lads from our parish helped Corrib RFC win the Connacht Under 17 League final beating Castlebar in Creggs 20-17. At the Shrule Glencorrib Community Alert AGM, Seamus Lohan retired as chairman after almost a decade serving in the role. His commitment to the group was commended by all. The Shrule Glencorrib Community Games is revived, starting off with the art competitions. Mary Keville & Peter Egan went home to God

MAR: Glencorrib Village Enhancement kicks off its first fundraiser, a table quiz in Cradock's, Shrule. GlenActive takes up Nordic Pole Walking. Due to the latest outbreak of Coronavirus, public Masses in the country are suspended from 15th March 2020. Rescheduled Autojumble sale also had to be cancelled. Both our community centres closed due to Covid19. Local GAA Club members help out with shopping deliveries etc during the Level 5 lockdown. Mother's Day had to be celebrated without visits or hugs. The Parish Facebook page began broadcasting the first of its many Masses live. There was a huge improvement in the weather front. After a washout January & February, a many weeks of glorious sunshine followed to the end of April. Mary Gavin, Mary Greaney, Nancy Heskin, Con McCole and James (Jim) Murphy went home to God.

APR: Parish Church bells ring out for all the health care workers who administered care and compassion to all those affected by Coronavirus. Fr. Vivian took over the newsletter from Kevin for the month. Kevin's mum Eileen passed away. Eamonn Mullin created the annual somewhat striking yet meaningful and beautiful Easter Tomb in St Joseph's church. Nora O'Sullivan and Eileen Flood went home to God

MAY: The first Parish Pastoral Council is formed. First Holy Communion had to be postponed. David Walsh & Sarah McKirdy were busy organising teams of GAA club members to deliver hundreds of grocery orders to elderly and vulnerable parishioners. New Parish Office hours are established in Shrule on Tuesdays and Glencorrib on Wednesdays. Mags Petty set up a 5km Virtual Fundraiser for Glencorrib Kilroe Walkway which raised over €3,500. Paddy Coyne, Gretta McHale, Maureen Smyth, Fergal Loftus went home to God

JUN: The Annual Cemetery Masses were cancelled. Father's Day had to be celebrated without visits. Cllrs Michael Burke, Damien Ryan & Patsy O'Brien made generous contributions to Glencorrib Village Enhancement footpath, Glencorrib Walkway, Community Centre and other community works. Shrule Village Enhancement gets more enthusiastic volunteers to help out the existing teams in the weekly clean up and maintenance of Shrule village. Seamus Farrell, John Loftus, Bert Ward and Timmy Beck went home to God.

JUL: Shrule Parish Pastoral Council was able to hold its first meeting. The resumption of public liturgies begins and congregations return to churches with certain limitations on numbers. Shrule Village enhancement committee installed two beautiful stands in the Green showing how rural life used to be in Shrule village and also the history of Shrule Castle. Our Parish newsletter celebrates 25 years in existence. Started way back in 1995 by Fr. John Creaven SMA in Glencorrib. A brief ceremony took place in Shrule Cemetery to commemorate the centenary of the death of an Old IRA casualty John Joe Kelleghan where the proclamation was read followed by a laying of a wreath at his grave. Stephen McDonagh, Mary Claire Columb, Kathleen Bohan, Mary O'Brien and Pat Henaghan went home to God.

AUG: The grounds around the grotto at Glencorrib Church are given a facelift with new stone surrounding. Parishioners were asked to mind their dogs as strange markings were seen on gates and stone walls. Annual Knock Novena is cancelled. Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament returns to both churches. Pupils returned to school protected by PPE (a new word that we never heard of till 2020) Congratulations to Shrule Glencorrib GAA Club Minor Team who were runners up in the South Mayo finals. A lot of derelict and vacant dwelling in Shrule village were purchased. Mick Hughes, Brid Egan, Johnny Laffey, Jim Ryan, Bob Harte, Fr. Paddy Gilligan and Esther Hart went home to God.

SEPT: Work begins on Glencorrib Walkway by contractors P.J. Loughlin Builders Ltd. Shrule Playground is back on the news. Leaving Cert results are out based on predicted grades as no exam took place. Western Care Association door to door collection goes online. Glencorrib NS thanked all those who supported the raffle which raised €2,180 in aid of the new footpath between the school and the new community walkway. Shrule man Paul Gibbons was appointed chairman of Leader (South West Mayo Development Co.) The previously postponed First Holy Communion was able to take place this month much to the delight of the young children and their families. Nancy Larkin, Mary Bohan, Fran Meyler, Anne Tierney, John Joe Lee, Paddy Mullin, Sean Flynn and John Moran went home to God.

OCT: Kille Abbey will receive €12,740 from the Community Monuments Funds to protect the heritage site. Glencorrib Walkway nears completion. Glencorrib Village enhancement prepare new flower beds & shored up a dangerous foundation to existing village footpath making it safe to construct a new stone wall near John Moran's house. Level 3 Covid19 restrictions return. No congregations at Masses. Chrissie

NOV: Glencorrib Walkway opens for use. Lights are on from 7am to 9am and 4pm to 11pm. Work continues on Shrule Church drainage at foundations. New car park entrance at Glencorrib Church opens. Planning application prepared for Shrule Playground. Michael Hyland, Martin Reilly, Louie Durkin, Rose Hearn and Pdraig Derrig went home to God.

DEC: Public Liturgies with a congregation return to Mass with numbers limited. Christmas Eve and Day Masses require booking as numbers are limited. Glencorrib Village Enhancement with support from Glencorrib Kilroe Community Centre installs a new Defibulator outside the community centre.

Mayo for Sam 2020 fever hits the parish. Glencorrib Church lit up on outside with green and red lights, flags, banners, festive Christmas Trees in fields where they grow etc. Congrats to all who helped take our minds a little bit off Coronavirus for a few weeks. Eamonn Mullin organised the Christmas cribs at Shrule Church. Gerry Murphy organises the Glencorrib Church crib. Mayo Co. Co. has tarred the existing footpath from Glencorrib Community Centre to Gerry Murphy's house. A new footpath from Glencorrib NS to Glencorrib walkway is currently being constructed and with the way the work is going, it will be fully completed in early January 2021. Coronavirus Level 5 restrictions return after Christmas Day. No congregations allowed at Mass for foreseeable time. Kathleen Robinson & Pamela Corbett went home to God.

ON THIS LAST WEEK OF 2020 of the year, it is customary to thank all those who helped out at both churches in our parish community during 2020. It's a longer list this year.

For me (Kevin), there is one group of people (a new group) who have to go the top of the thank you list. A group who we never had or knew much about prior to April 2020 (start of Coronavirus). THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT ROBINS

Be they sat on garden fence posts or their likeness emblazoned on half the Christmas cards that come through the door, it is definitely the season for one of our most recognisable garden birds. In honour of National Robin Day (21st Dec) Sean McMenemy of Ark Wildlife shared his top robin trivia...

1. Robins do not use the same nest more than once. However, they will stick to a territory and location in which they have previously reared a successful brood.

2. Robins are frantic breeders. They can start nest building as early as January and can

go on to have four or five broods of four to five eggs each per season. Sometimes the female will be incubating a clutch of eggs while the male continues to feed the previous brood.

3. With so many young being raised, why aren't we inundated with robins? Sadly, life expectancy is very short for robins. The average robin lives less than a year, with winter devastating their number

4. Male and female robins look alike, both having red breasts. These are used along with song to proclaim and hold territories year-round. Both sexes will fight off intruders in their own territories until a pair bond has formed. At this point the male becomes very aggressive, singing and fighting to repel any intruders on their shared patch.

5. Robins sing all year round and will even sing throughout the night if disturbed by loud noises such as car horns, thunder, or fireworks. Artificial streetlights will also trigger singing and robins can be seen sitting under street lamps singing throughout long winter nights in towns and cities.

6. Robins really are 'the early bird' with specially adapted eyes to see in low light, allowing them to start feeding earlier than other birds and even feed at night under street lamps.

7. Robins evolved following pigs and boar as they rootled about disturbing worms and invertebrates that the robin could eat. These days, the lack of wild boar means that robins follow gardeners who effectively do the same job. This habit of following anyone digging led to the robin being affectionately known as the 'gardener's friend'.

8. Robins are omnivores meaning they will eat a wide range of foods including seeds, fruit, insects, and worms. This means they are easy to attract and feed in gardens by offering a range of bird food including suet pellets, mealworms, and seed mixes.

9. And finally, why is the robin associated with Christmas? It's because Victorian postmen wore red tunics and were known as 'robins' or 'robin redbreasts'. After the uniform changed, the goodwill linked to postmen delivering Christmas cards got transferred to the bird and we still celebrate robins on Christmas cards to this day.



THE 12 DAYS OF CHRISTMAS

There is one Christmas Carol that has always baffled me. What in the world do leaping lords, French hens, swimming swans, and especially the partridge that won't come out of the pear tree have to do with Christmas? This week, I found out. From 1558 until 1829, Roman Catholics in England were not permitted to practice their faith openly. Someone during that era wrote this carol as a catechism song for young Catholics. It has two levels of meaning: the surface meaning plus a hidden meaning known only to members of their church. Each element in the carol has a code word for a religious reality which the children could remember.

1. The partridge in a pear tree was Jesus Christ.
2. Two turtle doves were the Old and New Testaments.
3. Three French hens stood for faith, hope and love.
4. The four calling birds were the four gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke & John.
5. The five golden rings recalled the Torah or Law, the first five books of the Old Testament.
6. The six geese a-laying stood for the six days of creation.
7. Seven swans a-swimming represented the sevenfold gifts of the Holy Spirit— Prophecy, Serving, Teaching, Exhortation, Contribution, Leadership, and Mercy.
8. The eight maids a-milking were the eight beatitudes.
9. Nine ladies dancing were the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit--Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness, and Self Control.
10. The ten lords a-leaping were the Ten Commandments.
11. The eleven pipers piping stood for the eleven faithful disciples.
12. The twelve drummers drumming symbolized the twelve points of belief in the Apostles' Creed.
